
Listening to the daily news across the country, I really think covid-19 has affected the brains of many people. I am sure you know what I am writing about here. We need to continue to pray!




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I added a couple of desert views from the area. One thing I am sorry we did not get to do while on the road in the motor home was to see the desert in full bloom in Spring.
